The nearest tube station is Kew Gardens, served by the District Line (Richmond branch) and London Overground. The journey from Central London takes approximately 40 minutes. The National Archives is a 10-minute walk from Kew Gardens station.

Where to go when you arrive

On your arrival at The National Archives, you do not need to check in at the main Reception Desk. Turn left towards the cafeteria (currently closed), and head for the cloakrooms. You will need to leave all bags and coats in the free lockers provided. **There are three lockers marked UCL that you can use. Please do not use any other locker.** Make your way to the first floor. (Please note that there is a lift just by the stairs). Proceed to the 'Start here' desk with your 'Letter of introduction' and form of ID (a current UK Driving Licence, a valid passport, or a UCL ID if you are a UCL member). You will then be shown to the reading room.

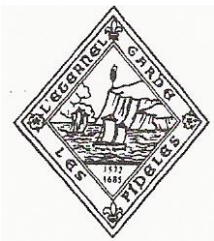
What you may take into the reading room

Please note that to minimise the risk of infections no pencils, paper, notepads and research notes in hard copy may be taken into the reading room.

Digital cameras – You may use a digital camera to photograph some documents but flash photography is not allowed. Please remember to disable your camera's flash facility. 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Mobile phones – Phones may be used in the reading room but must be turned to silent mode, and only used for text messaging or photography.

Laptops and tablets – You may bring tablets and laptops; the reading room has power sockets and wifi access.

Open access material

Books and journals on open access are still available in the reading room. They are removed at the end of each day and quarantined after each use.

Electronic resources

Readers can access the electronic resources from the computers in the reading room. **Computers are thoroughly cleaned each day and no more than one reader can use the same computer within a 24-hour period.** Whilst a member of staff will be in the reading room, they will not be able to switch on, or touch the keyboard.
